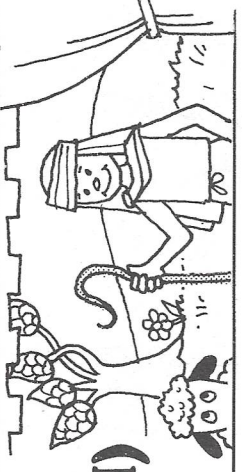
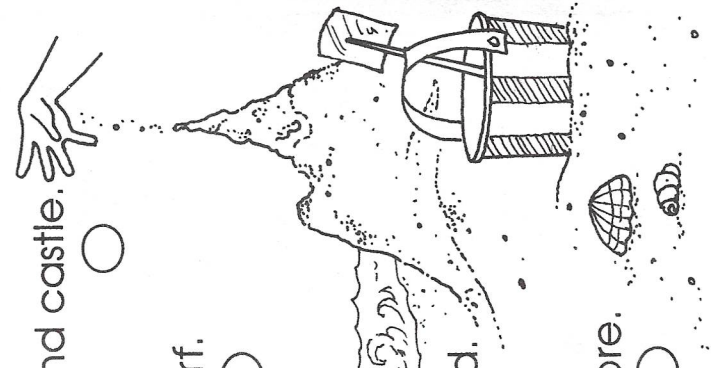


Common Nouns (I)

- 8. It was a perfect day at the shore.

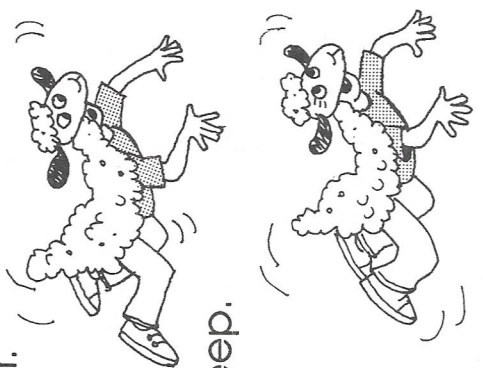


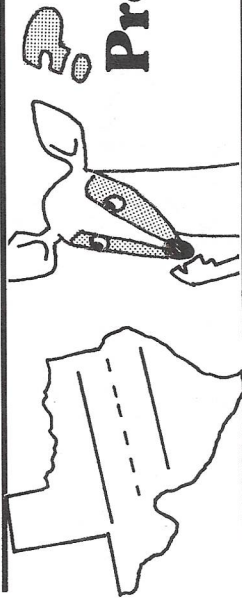

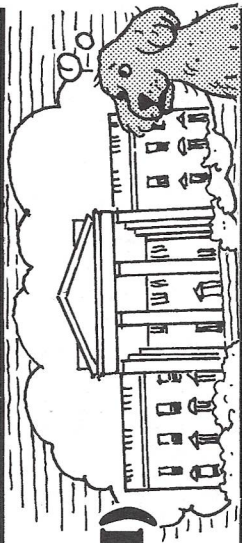
